Project Title: Decoding Information Bias: Exploring a Free and Fair Press

Grade Level/Subject/Discipline: Middle School - Social Studies

Time Frame: 2-3 weeks

Objective: Students will write and publish a class newspaper about the benefits and challenges of a free and fair press.





Student Choice

- Students will work in small groups.
- Each group will select one aspect of information bias or free and fair press to focus on.
- Students will select the category of news to explore and research.
- Students will select how to convey their research and information.





Authentic Experiences

Students learn about the definition of "news", and the differences between news reports, commentary, and editorial. They collaboratively create a school or class newspaper that incorporates some or all of the elements of print news, such as news reporting, news photography, infographics, commentary (column), advertising, and editorials.





Global Significance

Students will explore the following:

- What is the role of the press in a democracy?
- How can press freedoms come into conflict with other needs and priorities in a democracy?
- What does responsible consumption of news and information entail?
- What kinds of influences could bias news coverage, even in a democracy that protects freedom of the press?
- How can responsible citizens recognize and mitigate bias in the press?

The final product can be posted on a school website or on social media. Encourage students to take turns reading each other's news pieces and giving feedback.
